Ohio House Democrats Fight to Lower Property Taxes for Ohioans

As we all know, the rising cost of property taxes is a critical economic issue for Ohioans. Homeowners are searching for answers and are rightfully frustrated feeling the squeeze of higher property tax bills.

A handful of Republicans and special interests have rigged Ohio's tax code in favor of the wealthiest few, hurting Ohio homeowners and shifting the state's tax responsibility onto local communities, senior citizens, and middle-class families. This isn't cutting taxes. It's shifting taxes in our community— making you pay more locally so the state can pay less.

No one wants to pay more than their fair share in taxes. That's why tax-shifting is unfair. It funds giveaways for the wealthiest few, and cuts to local communities, shifting taxes away from the state onto local homeowners.

It doesn't have to be this way! Together, we can support policies and leaders to unrig Ohio's tax system, so the state stops shifting the tax responsibility onto homeowners and local communities.

House Democrats have introduced several bills to help lower your property taxes:

- **HB 60 (Troy)** Increases the homestead exemption for elderly or disabled homeowners and certain surviving spouses
- **HB 263 (Isaacsohn/Hall)** Freezes property taxes for qualified homeowners
- HB 274 (Dell'Aquila/Matthews) For individuals who qualify and have owned their homes for more than 20 years, this bill increases the exemption from \$26,200 to \$50,000.Joint Committee on Property Tax Review and Reform This committee, proposed by Rep. Troy, with the intent of examining and identifying solutions to address some of the concerns with Ohio's property tax laws.
- HB 645 (Isaacsohn) Legislation authorizing a
 property tax circuit breaker benefit for eligible
 homeowners and renters whose property taxes, or
 portion of rent attributable to property taxes,
 exceeds 5% of their income.

LEAP Initiative Re-Affirms K-12 Education as a Democratic Priority

In June, Ohio House Democrats introduced the Learning & Education Advancement Package (LEAP) Initiative, legislation to reaffirm K-12 education as a Democratic priority, setting goals and standards for our education system going into the new school year for for-profit charter school oversight, private school vouchers accountability, investing in early childhood education, and supporting public schools, educators, and students.

Some of the K-12 education House bills being highlighted include charter school oversight, private school voucher accountability, public school support and funding, student support, and teacher support.

As part of its People First agenda, House Democrats are committed to creating a state that works for and supports all Ohio children's education, regardless of race, gender, income, and zip code.



Governor DeWine Signs HB 253 into Law

Governor DeWine signed House Bill 253~ Designating the Brigadier General Charles Young Memorial Corridor into law on Monday, July 22nd at the Charles Young Buffalo Soldiers National Monument. Representative Upchurch was joined by his joint sponsor, Representative Holmes and several buffalo soldiers. "It is important that we amplify our ancestors that went out of their way to establish change for our culture; I am so honored to be able to recognize a man as esteemed as General Charles Young." - Representative Upchurch. This is the second bill in the past two months that has been signed into law by the Governor from State Representative Terrence Upchurch!




Special Press Conference on HB 605

Representative Upchurch hosted a press conference about the importance of House Bill 605, alongside Joint Sponsor Representative Creech and NFL Players Association Public Policy and Staff Counsel Andrew Morris. HB 605 will require all professional sporting stadiums to have natural grass fields rather than turf. Too often professional athletes suffer from noncontact lower extremity injuries due to the turf they are playing on and players overwhelming would rather play on natural grass fields. This bill will help to promote workplace safety and is awaiting its first hearing in the House Economic and Workforce Development Committee. You can watch the full press conference here.
