New Legislation Spotlight: House Bill 602

This month, Representative Smith introduced House bill 602 alongside Representative Sharon Ray. This bipartisan bill would require public hospitals to designate at least five percent of their impatient capacity for persons who seek voluntary admission for mental health purposes. Hospitals may waive this requirement during circumstances such as public health emergencies or mass casualty events.

"We need to ensure hospitals are prepared and able to offer those seeking admission the help they deserve," Representative Smith said.

The bill also calls for a person admitted into that designated capacity to receive the following, as determined appropriate by the hospital's chief clinical officer:

(1) Up to 24 hours of stabilization;

(2) Up to 72 hours for observation, diagnosis, care, or treatment.

The bill now waits for an assignment to a House committee.

Updates on HB 327, the Republican big government censorship bill

Last month, House Republicans on the State and Local Government Committee accepted yet another substitute version of <u>House Bill 327</u>, a bill that seeks to censor discussion topics in public schools and other public settings.

Each version of HB 327 has included a long list of ideas to censor.

The most recent version of the bill includes several alarming new provisions to go with the concerns prior versions raised. These ambiguous measures raise many questions, including: When the bill says we can't discuss inherent

- racism, "whether consciously or unconsciously," does that bar law enforcement agencies from conducting implicit bias trainings? When it says failing to "present both sides... of a
- political or ideological belief" is conduct unbecoming of a teacher, does that mean we can't teach history anymore? How do you teach both sides of slavery? Of the Holocaust? Of 9/11? When it says our history "dispels the idea that the United States... is systemically racist," how do we
- make progress in curtailing racism and its real and ongoing effects? When universities are intentional about making diversity, equity, and

inclusion a priority to enrich the experience of everyone on their campus, do they have to stop?


