Last month, the U.S. Supreme Court's conservative majority struck down Roe v. Wade. It's troubling to imagine women in the United States not having the freedom to control their own bodies or make decisions about their own health care.

As Americans, we know people should have the fundamental freedom to make decisions about their own bodies and health care. This ruling takes that freedom away, and lets partisan politicians decide if women have the right to control their own bodies.

<u>Over 60% of Ohioans</u> agree with the Roe v. Wade decision to allow access to abortion. Despite this, the same day it was overturned, a Republican law banning abortion after six weeks, a point when many women don't even know they are pregnant, officially took effect in Ohio.

Democrats are continuing to protect women's freedom to access the health care they need, including abortion. House and Senate Democrats have proposed an <u>amendment</u> to Ohio's Constitution that would ensure all people have the freedom to make decisions about their bodies and health care.

Rep. Humphrey calls out AEP for power outages that left 240,000 Ohioans out of power



Last month, due to grid strain, PJM ordered AEP to "shed load" which resulted in approximately a third of the Central Ohio service territory having to go without power.

During the peak of the power outage, 240,000 customers were without power.

"This is unacceptable," said Rep. Humphrey.

During the outages, Rep. Humphrey joined local cooling centers and neighborhoods to help constituents in dire need of water, ice, and shelter. This was followed by a meeting with AEP executives where they were held accountable for their untimeliness and professionalism during the outage. In response, AEP announced that starting Monday, June 20, they are expanding the current bill assistance available through the Neighbor to Neighbor program. Current funding available through this program is \$2.7 million. This special expanded assistance opportunity will provide eligible AEP Ohio customers with a grant applied directly to their bill, even if they are not currently past due. Customers can learn more and, if eligible, apply between June 20 and July 29, 2022 at AEPOhio.com/n2n while funds are available.
