OHIOANS WANT SAFE & RESPONSIBLE CUN OWNERSHIP LAWS.

June is Gun Violence Awareness Month. Gun violence is an epidemic in this country, and we know that the majority of Ohioans want stricter gun laws. Yet Republicans continue to loosen regulations and pass legislation like permit less carry.

My Democratic colleague, Representative Cecil Thomas, and I will be introducing legislation this month requiring trigger locks to be attached and provided with firearm sales. This is just one measure that can prevent senseless shootings and save innocent lives.



Happy Pride Month! June is designated as National Pride Month to celebrate the LGBTQ+ community and to honor the protests at Stonewall. This month reflects the strides towards equal justice and opportunity for the LGBTQ+ community.

Legislative Updates before Summer Recess

Before the Ohio Legislature breaks for Summer recess, we are anticipating bills, both good and bad, to move to the floor quickly this month.

Some bad bills that take away the rights of Ohioans to watch out for are:

- **HB 6:** Bans transgender athletes from participating in girls' sports. HB 6 has passed out of committee **and is anticipated to be brought up for a House vote .** Contact all Republican members to voice your opposition to this bill.
- **HB 68:** Bans gender affirming care for minors, including all mental health services. HB 68 is anticipated to **pass out of Public Health Committee and move to the House floor.** Contact Chairman Lipps at rep55@ohiohouse.gov to voice your opposition.
- **SB 83/151:** These bills eliminates higher education employees' right to strike, bars institutions from receiving state funding if they have DEI programs, and censors free speech.

SB 83 **passed out of the Senate**, and both bills now sit in the House Higher Education Committee. Reach out to Chairman Tom Young at rep37@ohiohouse.gov to stop these bills.

Despite the numerous bills in the Ohio Legislature that are detrimental to Ohioans, there are pieces of legislation that will benefit all. These include:

- **HB 171:** Changes the model social studies curriculum to include the history and contributions of cultural minority groups
- **HB 170:** Creates Red Flag Laws in the state of Ohio
- **HB 57**: Increases the Homestead Exemption to account for inflation. This **passed the House last month and heads to the Senate.**

We must continue to work to solve the real life problems facing Ohioans, like the economy, funding our public schools, and keeping everyone safe from gun violence.



On May 9, the House passed SJR2, despite hundreds of Ohioans showing up to protest at the Statehouse. F SJR2, now known as Issue 1, will create minority rule by taking away the last option for citizens to be a • check on the Statehouse.

House Republicans amended the resolution to allow for a special election in August, just months after they voted to get rid of all special elections for being too costly to taxpayers. The passage of this resolution was a blatant violation of our constitutional rights.

This should not be a partisan issue, but it has become one. If Issue 1 passes, no constitutional amendment would pass without a 60% vote. Here is a timeline of what is to come:

- Monday July 10: Deadline to register for the August 8 election
- **Tuesday, July 11:** Early, in-person absentee voting begins
- **Tuesday, July 11:** Deadline for absentee ballot applications to be received by the county Boards of Elections. Boards will be open until 8"30 p.m. that day
- **Tuesday, August 8:** Election Day. Polls will be open from 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.



Starting this month, both AEP and FirstEnergy users may experience higher electricity bills due to rising demand and energy prices worldwide.

AEP rates are going up 28% and do not apply to customers who have shopped around for another provider or are covered by a government aggregation program. PUCO has been advising Ohioans to shop around for other energy companies.

Using <u>EnergyChoiceOhio.gov and then using the</u> <u>Apples to Apples</u> comparison tool, Ohioans can view rates, terms, and conditions associated with competitive generation supply offerings.
