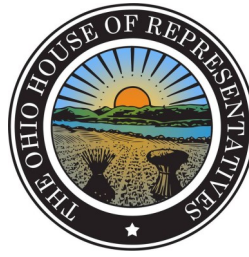

## State Representative Sean Patrick Brennan Calls for the State to Step Up to Protect Food Insecure Residents

If you know me, you know that my single mom worked hard her whole life — at the May Company during the day and bartending at night — and still had to rely on food stamps to make ends meet. I've never forgotten what that was like. No one working that hard should ever have to worry about putting food on the table.

Right now, 1.4 million Ohioans — nearly half of them children — rely on food assistance through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). But as of November 1, SNAP benefits are not being issued until federal funding is renewed due to the federal shutdown. That means millions of Ohio families are being left in limbo, unsure where their next meal will come from.

Ohio's food banks are already stretched thin. The federal government recently cut federal SNAP spending, and Ohio's latest state budget provides \$7.5 million less for food banks than last year. The result is a perfect storm — fewer resources at a time when more people than ever need help.

This isn't just a humanitarian crisis — it's an economic one. Every \$1 in SNAP spending generates about \$1.54 in local economic activity. Cuts to these benefits also hurt grocers, farmers, truckers, and small businesses across our state.

Here in House District 14, about 18,000 residents — 15% of our population — depend on SNAP. These are people I see and hear from every day, including our seniors, veterans, single parents, and hardworking families just trying to get by.

All of this is why I have been a constant advocate for robust funding for our foodbanks and why I have been calling on my colleagues in the Legislature to tap into our state's \$4 billion rainy day fund to help folks weather this storm and what may become a hurricane of hunger.

## State Representative Brennan Hosts Latvian Defense Minister

Recently, I had the honor of hosting **Latvian State Secretary Aivars Puriņš** and his delegation for a visit and tour of the Ohio Statehouse. The Secretary's visit highlighted the growing connections between Ohio and our allies in Europe—especially those on the front lines of defending democracy and freedom.

Secretary Puriņš' visit to Ohio focused on the state of transatlantic defense cooperation and the deep bonds that connect Americans and Europeans across the Atlantic. With Ohio's strong defense manufacturing base and our state's steadfast support for Ukraine, this conversation could not be more timely or more important.

The visit was organized in partnership with the German Marshall Fund, which has been working to bring together state and local officials, business leaders, and students to discuss NATO's critical role in ensuring global stability, security, and prosperity. These discussions remind us that what happens overseas directly affects our communities here at home — from jobs in Ohio's defense industry to the global fight for democracy.

Ohio has stood firmly with Ukraine and our NATO allies, and I was proud to help continue that conversation right here at our Statehouse. Strengthening our international relationships not only supports peace and security abroad but also reinforces Ohio's role as a key partner in the transatlantic alliance.





## State Rep. Brennan Introduces Amendment to Double the Property Tax Homestead Exemption

COLUMBUS — **State Rep. Sean Patrick Brennan (D-Parma)** Wednesday introduced an amendment to **House Bill (HB) 335** that would've doubled the Homestead Exemption for Ohio seniors and disabled homeowners, offering what he described as "substantive, noticeable, and state-funded property tax relief" for those struggling on fixed incomes. The amendment was tabled on the House floor, preventing this provision from being added to **HB 335** which was passed in a later vote Wednesday.

"Too many Ohioans — especially seniors — are being taxed out of the very homes they worked their entire lives to pay off," said **Rep. Brennan**. "With all due respect, **HB 335** as currently written is like dumping a cup of water on a forest fire. Our constituents are demanding real relief, not token gestures. Doubling the Homestead Exemption will make a meaningful difference for those who need it most."

**Rep. Brennan** emphasized that the state of Ohio is financially capable of funding this expanded relief, noting the strength of the state's current fiscal position. "Our budget is healthy, our revenues are strong, and our Rainy Day Fund is overflowing — and if you've listened to our seniors and homeowners lately, you know it's pouring," said **Rep. Brennan** on the House floor.

The amendment comes amid growing public frustration with rising property taxes and the emergence of a ballot initiative seeking to eliminate property taxes entirely — a move **Rep. Brennan** warns would devastate schools, local governments, and first responders.

"If we don't act decisively to provide state-funded relief, that initiative will gain traction," said **Rep. Brennan**.

"The consequences could cripple our schools' ability to educate our children and our communities' ability to provide police, fire, and other essential services. This amendment, along with my **Property Tax Rebate Bill**, are proactive measures to prevent that crisis."

**Rep. Brennan** urged bipartisan support for the measure, calling it a fair and financially responsible way to ensure that Ohio seniors can stay in their homes while protecting the future of local services.

"Ohio has the means to help those who helped build this state," concluded **Rep. Brennan**. "Let's use it wisely and compassionately."
