

BACKGROUND

The Reproductive Care Act repeals existing statutes that restrict abortion care and adds protections for patients and providers, including data privacy, nondiscrimination, and civil and criminal reforms for evidence-based care.

KEY FEATURES

The legislation will enhance provider access and promote patient autonomy by eliminating:

- 6-week and 20-week abortion bans
- Mandatory waiting periods
- Transfer agreements
- Other TRAP laws

Additionally, it will establish new statutes that eliminate barriers impeding the physician/patient relationship and access to care, including:

- Prohibits regulatory entities from collecting, retaining, using, or disclosing personal reproductive or sexual health information, including disclosure to third parties, such as other states and law enforcement, and establishes causes of civil action.
- Prohibits a health care provider or health care facility from being required or compelled to provide patient records to any out-of-state 3rd party.
- Makes it an unlawful discriminatory practice under Ohio's Civil Rights Law for an employer to discriminate against a person because of any reproductive health care decision.
- Permits telehealth as an acceptable method of provider treatment for reproductive care.
- Provides immunity from civil, criminal, and professional disciplinary action to health care providers, facilities, helpers, or individuals accessing or seeking reproductive care.
